Fertilize Carefully

Reduce Shade

Freeze/Frost Prep

or hard freeze can still damage your turf. In the event of a frost (that is, when it's just cold enough for ice crystals to form on the surface of your lawn...but not quite cold enough to freeze), run your irrigation for a few minutes to rinse away this layer of frost and minimize damage to the grass blade.

If a freeze occurs, don't water at all. Watering in freezing conditions will only intensify any damage to your grass. By having properly prepared your grass for this weather, your turf should shed any dead tissue and rebound nicely in the spring.

Floridians are all too familiar with fire ants. Their unsightly mounds, painful sting, and aggressive nature make them one of the most problematic ants around. But don't let these ants give all ants a bad name. In fact, there's an ant

that closely resembles a fire ant, but is quite beneficial.

If you've ever noticed a small pyra-

mid-shaped ant mound, then you've seen the humble abode of the industrious pyramid ant. These modest little dunes contain only 0.4% of the ants found in a fire ant nest; and unlike their fiery cousins, pyramid ants aren't aggressive and can't sting. In fact, one of their primary food sources is other insects. This may include larval forms of lawn damaging pests...and even fire ants!
